'Karaoke_me' was both as an online work and gallery installation. The work focuses on the creation of diary-songs, based on online diary entries completed by the audience, and performed by a 3D model of the artist. The work was nominated for a BAFTA and recently won a webarts award.

'Oral Tradition' was an interactive installation. The work used speech synthesis and speech recognition software to create a relationship between memory, viewer and animated performers, who perform a saccharine duet. 'Oral Tradition' is a work in progress.

TouchStone represents the stories of ten Dorset residents who have come into contact with Dorset hospital. Each decade from the last hundred years is represented by an individual patient. Users create unique textual relationships between patients/residents stories by placing their hands on touch sensitive carved sandstone.

Data.love is a digital dating agency with a difference. Data.love takes the physical attributes and personal desires of the audience member filling out a questionnaire, and matches them with a virtual entity.
